Lorimer's farewell greeting to the Church family

2025 has been a very challenging year! And it's been my privilege to share in this year with you, and also with the folk over in Rannoch.

The overall plan was to create a new linked charge between the parishes of Loch Tay and Glenlyon with the parishes at Loch Rannoch. If the plan was achieved successfully, it would open the door to finding a new Minister. It pleases me to know that our objective has been reached.

Initially, it required a new Union, a new Linkage, a new name, a new nominating committee and, eventually a new Minister. It all started with the Perth Presbytery Mission Plan, which was designed and then approved by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. The plan was designed to ensure that there would continue to be Christian worshipping communities on both sides of Schiehallion, served by a new minister, covering this vast area in Highland Perthshire.

Inevitably, it required critical, stressful, and even for some, very sad changes to enable the continuance of worshipping congregations under the Church of Scotland banner. These very painful changes have been brought about because of the severe reduction in regular worshippers, the steep increase in the cost of maintenance of buildings, and the apparent sad decline and disinterest from folk in attending church worship. All of that resulting in unsustainable and very serious financial difficulties. No organisation could cope with that kind of situation. Our churches are a typical

example of the realities of that truth and are mirrored by many other churches all over Scotland.

And so, on the 24th April this year, our Kirk Session acting as Trustees, voted by a large majority to sell Kenmore Church to the Kenmore and District Community Council, a decision fully approved by Perth Presbytery and by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh. Since then, the Community Council has been working hard to organise and process the purchase, including canvassing the views of the local community. This survey resulted in a large majority in favour of the Community Council plans, thus securing for them a strong brief to move ahead with the purchase.

Given the positive developments taking place regarding the sale of Kenmore Church, and the upcoming induction of our new minister, your Kirk Session, acting as Trustees, have voted with a large majority to now adopt a plan for ceasing to designate Kenmore Church as a place of regular worship from the 30th November 2025.

Rev Joanne Foster, our new Minister, understands the reasons why we need to take this action now. She feels we should phase it in over the next few months, giving the members of the congregation an early indication that we are ceasing to designate Kenmore Church as a place of regular worship. This will be followed with a special service led by her to mark that cessation in Kenmore Church on the 23rd November just before Advent. This service would mark the change to a new pattern for the parish, and to Joanne's new ministry.

For me, this year has been a special honour and privilege to ride alongside both Kirk Sessions and Church families in each congregation, supporting you all with the changes, and finding suitable people for preaching week by week, bringing variety and quality teaching with warmth and insight. The icing on the cake is to have found a new minister.

I am indebted to the members of each Kirk Session who have graciously and diligently helped me steer the changes forward, eventually securing a wonderful new minister who will bring her gifting and experience to the new linked charge of Loch Tay and Glenlyon with Rannoch.

I will continue to pray for you all in the future, that the life of both congregations will grow and develop, honouring God and reaching out into the local communities with the Good News of the love of Jesus Christ.

I write this article with my heart-felt thanks and appreciation.

Tay and Lyon Guild

Over the past two years our local Guild, the Tay and Lyon Guild, has become depleted in numbers. The Secretary, Anne Towns and the Convener, Elaine Melrose approached the Dull and Weem Guild with a view to joining forces. We were welcomed and are now about to embark on the first year of this joint venture which certainly makes it more viable to invite visiting speakers along to the meetings.

The meetings are held from 2pm in the MacDonald Room at Weem Church on the second Thursday of the month.

The first meeting is on Thursday 9th October when a speaker from one of the current Guild Projects Partners, Crossreach, will come to talk about the project which is called 'Playful Beginnings'. With this Project, the Guild will support specialist perinatal therapy with creche support at Sunflower Garden in Edinburgh. They will also support the improvement of children's health and wellbeing through play and nurture at Daisy Chain in Glasgow, a community based, inclusive, early intervention project for children under 12 and their families. These projects will strengthen family relationships and support them to become more resilient.
