OUTER HEBRIDEAN HOLIDAY MEMOIRS FROM ANNE TOWNS

Many years ago, in 1987, we visited the Outer Hebrides for the first time. We stayed at a place in Lewis called Cliff, in the days before it was a surfing destination. A very pleasant three weeks passed, during which we visited Stornoway a couple of times. Surprisingly, in the Main Street, there was a thriving business, describing itself as The Hat Shop.

Later, during our stay, we attended the Church of Scotland service in Miavaig. As the ladies of the congregation entered the church, we realised why the Hat Shop was so successful! A lapsed custom now as all are bare-headed these days! The service was conducted by the local GP who was a Lay Reader. The service was a special evening service in English but all the hymns were still in Gaelic and there was no organist. The congregational singing was led by a Precentor and very moving to listen to. Prayers were said standing and hymns sung seated. A visit during the sermon by the doctor's dog added to the uniqueness of the experience!

In recent years, we have been visiting South Uist every year, at least twice! We stay near Howmore, a historical Christian site with interesting ruined buildings. The current Church of Scotland, which we go to, is a lovely old building. It's claim to fame is its central Communion Table, which is still in use, along with the Common Cup. There are little gates to open before all sitting on benches around the long communion table. The cup is passed along from hand to hand. Presbyterians are very much in the minority in South Uist although there is also a Free Church of Scotland in Daliburgh.

A feature of South Uist is the huge Hew Lorimer statue, Our Lady of the Isles. The Parish Priest, who was nicknamed 'Father Rocket', raised funds to build it when the MOD built a rocket testing range in Uist. South Uist and Eriskay are also the only places in the UK to have wayside shrines. There are several Catholic Churches, including a small one next to our holiday cottage. Mass is said there every week on a Wednesday, and well attended.

The Church of Scotland charge of South Uist is a joint one along with Barra. Our ministers may sometimes face a journey in inclement weather, but, at least, they never have to get on a ferry!

LATEST CHURCH NEWS FROM ALEXANDER TOWNS, SESSION CLERK Linkage with Rannoch

At the meeting of the Kirk Session in early May, it was noted that, following the visit to Rannoch in February, we had not received any feedback regarding linkage. We expressed our concerns about the viability of this proposed linkage to the Convenor of the Presbytery Planning and Deployment Committee. Now, there is to be a meeting of the Kirk Session with representatives of Presbytery later this month. We will keep you informed of developments.

We were visited by the Presbytery's Buildings Officer (a conservation surveyor and heritage specialist) and a director of Mill Architects, who is an RIAS Advanced Conservation Architect, on Wednesday 22nd May. This allowed an initial survey to be undertaken and preparatory plans to be drawn.

GLENLYON CHURCH NEWS FROM ROBERT BROWN

A delightful service was held at Glenlyon church on the 19th May 2024. The service was led by our Interim Moderator, the very Reverend Robert Nicol. The church looked beautiful and was artfully decorated with a wide variety of seasonal flowers, including laburnum, tulips, aquilegia, clematis, lupins, Lily of the Valley and rose garlands.

After the service, we had a lovely time catching up with one another over tea, coffee and a groaning table buffet. More than a few people, asked about the future of Glenlyon church as the Church of Scotland undergoes what has been described as "radical reform" amid falling congregations.

Well, we hope and pray, that once the dust has settled, Glenlyon will become a festival church. A festival church is a church building, which is not used for weekly worship, but is valued and required by the community for local events, and for festivals of the church and for rites of passage (ie baptisms, weddings and funerals). These festivals include Harvest Festival, Christmas and Easter, but also local festivals such as Mother's Day and Remembrance Sunday etc. A festival church can also accommodate more secular events, for example, a music night.

We plan to have our next service at Glenlyon church sometime in October. We hope you can join us in fellowship.
